

The Small Area Plan is a document that records a long-term vision about what people want for their neighborhood and how to get there. It's important for a few reasons: It is a contract with the City about what they will do and provide for the neighborhood, mainly regarding zoning, land use and infrastructure improvements. It is a place to tell the City what else the neighborhood expects--for example with arts, jobs, and education--so that the City can advocate for this vision, even with other parts of government like the County, State, or Metro Transit. Frogtown Neighborhood Association will use the plan to set an agenda for its work.





Why Does SMAPL Matter?

After SMAPL is adopted by the City, the City uses the plan to help make decisions about the neighborhood. For example...



What's the process for SMAPL?

This summer and fall, Frogtown staff and volunteers will talk with community members about what you want to see in the neighborhood.



Next, all this information gets turned into a document that describes the neighborhood plan.



Frogtown Neighborhood Association uses your input to guide its work.



The community reviews the completed draft plan.



Our plan is submitted to the City to be reviewed and approved.



Once our plan is adopted by the City, it becomes part of the City's comprehensive plan, and is used to make decisions.



The City's comprehensive plan is adopted by Met Council.



Our plan is in place for about 10 years, when it will be updated again by the neighborhood.
